Meyler Campbell Hosts Business Coaching Sessions in aid of Marie Curie Cancer Care

Leaders in business coach training, Meyler Campbell were at Merchant Taylors Hall in the City of London on March 7th to provide 45-minute coaching sessions in aid of its adopted charity, Marie Curie Cancer Care.

The coaching sessions were conducted by graduates and current participants of the Meyler Campbell Business Coach Programme, the acknowledged leader in training for top-level business coaches.

The coaches for the day, who all volunteered their time for free, were freelance business coaches and in-house coaching specialists from a wide variety of firms from across the City. Merchant Taylors Hall also chipped in by hosting the day at no charge, and Meyler Campbell sponsored the day by covering the running costs, so all donations go straight to Marie Curie.
